

IT WAS DEMOCRATIC

THE UNDEFERRED IN POSSESSION OF THE STATE CAPITAL. Vast Multitudes in Attendance—The House and Senate Ready for Business—Detailed Report of the Proceedings—Appointments—Notes of the Day.

It has been most decidedly a Democratic day. Multitudes of Democrats thronged the streets, hotels and the capitol. For 37 long years they have not been "in" upon the assembling of the legislature, but they made up for it today, judging from the enthusiasm manifested.

Standing room in Representative hall was at a premium when Clerk Crossman of the last house called the new house to order at high noon.

Rev. Jordan of the First Presbyterian church of this city conducted the devotional exercises, after which the roll, as certified to by the secretary of state, was called. The roll call was interrupted by a large number who were discussing our stirring Democratic news in the rounds of the capitol.

Upon the roll of the members, Representative Cook, of Muskegon, offered a protest against the seat of De Vere Hall, of Ogemaw county. The protest was received and will be referred to the committee on elections when the appointment of the members of the new House is made.

The Senate. The gavel of Lieut. Gov. Strong fell at 12 o'clock. After the senators had been sworn in by the presiding officer, the order of election of officers was taken up.

Although Senators Park and Smith of Detroit bolted the Democratic caucus nominations in several cases, which was the Democratic nominees were elected.

The election of officers being disposed of, Lieut. Gov. Strong set forth many sensible ideas in a brief opening address to the members of the new assembly.

After these the officers were sworn in. Things were not in good running order at 1 o'clock, and the members of the new House adjourned until 2:30. Upon the resuming of the session, the Democratic caucus nominations were read and the members of the new House were appointed.

President pro tem—Robert L. Taylor of Lapeer. Secretary—Low M. Miller of Kent. Sergeant-at-Arms—J. N. Betts of Ionia.

MORE SILVER TALK.

Plumb and Teller Against Hiseock. WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—At the conclusion of Senator Danies' speech Senator Plumb spoke in favor of the silver bill. He called attention to the rapid growth of the gold and silver industries in the increase of circulating medium. He believed there ought to come, and will come, as a result of increased recognition of silver in this country, a system of international metallic money.

Senator Hiseock followed Mr. Plumb in opposition to the bill. He believed fully one-half of our population did not favor the free coinage of silver. It was represented by the advocates of silver that believers in a gold standard were confined to the bankers and brokers of Wall street. They had ridiculed and despised what they were pleased to designate as "silver talk."

Mr. Hiseock then spoke further, explaining the payment of international money. He said that the gold and silver of England would not permit unlimited coinage of silver and could only preserve its value by the free coinage of silver.

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The subsidy bill was again the subject of the afternoon's proceedings in the house. At the close of Mr. Herbert's remarks Mr. Dingley made a speech of over two hours' duration in which he called attention to the question of the subsidy.

The order which accomplishes this state of affairs designates Captains Ewers, Fifth Infantry; Earnest, Eighth Infantry; Lee, Ninth Infantry; and Pierce, Ninth Infantry, as the agents of the Interior department.
