A HIGH OLD BACHELOR HELD FOR RANSOM.

Joseph Perrien Abducted by Un- known Parties. His Demanded \$15,000 for His Release—Let- ters From the Missing Man.

Detroit, March 20.—One of the most daring cases of kidnaping and attempted extortion of a large sum as ransom that has ever been heard of in this country occurred in the very center of Detroit last night. About 10 o'clock, Joseph Perrien, a well known and respected citizen and the proprietor of the Grand Rapids mills, sat in his residence, 31 Catherine street, in the rear of the mill, with his nephew, Albert Hesselbacher, and his niece, Miss Leoni Chabot, who lived with Mr. Perrien.

At about 10 o'clock this morning the same young man again rang the door bell at Mr. Perrien's residence and delivered a large envelope addressed to Albert Hesselbacher. The messenger left immediately after delivering the envelope to Mr. Hesselbacher, but the envelope was found as it was handed to him. It contained a lengthy epistle which set forth that Mr. Perrien was in the custody of five writers and would be held until they were furnished with \$15,000 in ransom.

This communication, coming as it did and bearing unmistakable evidence and evidently in a state of great fear and perturbation, naturally caused the great excitement of the family. The note from the unknown parties was explicit, setting forth that Mr. Perrien was to be held until \$15,000 was paid and time for the ransom was now at work upon the case. One of the first steps taken was to find Mr. Stange, and he was discovered in some way. Mr. Stange declared his ignorance of the communication and said that he had never made, and naming the place and time for the ransom was now at work upon the case.
