THE MINERS STRIKE.

The governor of Pennsylvania is not eagerly ready and anxious to order out the state troops to aid striking miners.

He tells the mine owners he will not do so until the miners of the civil officers are exhausted, and that is right.

This is a people's government, it is especially not a military despotism. The first thing for employes of labor to do is to be just to their employes. All accounts from the mining district of Pennsylvania and West Virginia are full of tales of slavery and destitution among miners that is a reproach to our country.

The miners are being mercilessly robbed by the grasping owners of the mines. It is no wonder the miners have become desperate. The mine owners were duly notified of the intentions of the miners to rebel and had plenty of time to avert a strike by fair proposals, but they determined not to do so. They knew the desperate character of these slaves of theirs and should have prepared themselves for the possible consequences of their indifference to the just demands of the masses.

We are utterly opposed to violence on the part of the strikers. We cannot say that we should have favored the strike as the last resort of these suffering toilers. The civil authorities are authorized to swear in and arm every citizen to the community if necessary as a police force for the defense of life and property.

The military arm is feeble at best in Pennsylvania and its employment is more base than right in its efficacy. Governor Pattison is right in emphasizing the character of this government as one of the people by refusing the militia until the sheriff had reported in his inability to make his posse effective against the strikers and requesting the assistance of the militia. Besides, in his way the mine owners themselves get a chance to shudder with fear while the miners themselves feel the distress of want.

The coal miners have not only to earn their wages by hard labor, but they have to live in a state of death or disability from the deadly gas, floods and falling walls. This has been sadly shown in many instances of mournful disasters within the past year. Labor has been completely paralyzed by the occupation a battle for life and death and commands for the miner more than the usual sympathy that is elicited by his suffering as a poorly paid toiler.

ITALY IS MAD.

The withdrawal of the Italian minister from Washington because "the king of Italy is dissatisfied with the present adjustment between the two countries in regard to the New Orleans massacre" will be a great surprise to the country.

This is not a declaration of war, nor is it probable that the United States will issue such a declaration, but it might be, and the time has been when the demand for a passport by a minister was equivalent to such a declaration.

"The king of Italy" is welcome to his dissatisfaction, and he should be allowed to cherish it as long as he pleases.

All the world is informed, or should be, as to our form of government. The general government has no authority over the domestic affairs of any state.

The subjects of the King of Italy knew this when they became residents of New Orleans, and if they did not it is not the fault of our authorities at Washington.

All the newspapers of our country have done, and really more, for we went so far as to characterize the execution of the Mafia in terms that reflected on the citizens of New Orleans who became the executioners in this memorable affair.

The full terms of the letter of Gov. Nichols to Secretary Blaine, has, perhaps, just struck "the king of Italy" like the upper cut of a pugilist, and that is what is all the abroad king.

The United States are not in the least to blame for the condition of mind that afflicts the king of Italy and can do but little more to relieve him. If Italy fondly imagines it can make anything by quarreling with the United States in the trouble before. We may get left on the floor for a short time but we will get even if it becomes necessary to build a navy for the special purpose of knocking Venice into the bay of Naples.

THE ASHLERS.

The Ashley, in violation of law, suddenly concentrated a force of 100 men on their railroad from Leland to South Haven to the state, Saturday night, and this proceeded through the hours of Sunday, when the courts were closed, before and carried away the valuable part of a railroad, for the construction of which they were paid by the people of the line a bonus of \$1,000 per mile.

It was a gross violation of law to do this work on Sunday, for which the power of the state should be used for the instant punishment of every offender.

The people are defrauded and robbed who were induced to give these advertisements a bonus to build this road.

Once built, the law should never permit its abandonment under any circumstances, unless with the consent of the people on the line and a return of the money they paid a bonus.

These advertisements were very profuse of promises to get the right tout and fill through the farmer's fields and orchards, not even regarding the ground his house occupied, and to have him pay a sum of money to enable the state to send advertisement to build the road without expenses to themselves.
