At the first interview Egan denied the crime, but later related the same story as that told by Minnie Dyer. Estiman, relating to the killing, said the deposition was never read to O'Connor but that he had a quarrel; that O'Connor called the prosecutor a liar; that Egan returned to the house and struck O'Connor then knocked O'Connor down, kicking him several times after he was down.

Miss Kennedy was recalled to the witness stand and testified that she saw Egan enter the house at 10 o'clock on the night of the murder. She went to a dance at Mr. Parker's house on July 3 with Egan and O'Connor was there and saw him kill O'Connor with a knife.

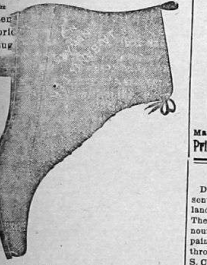
