The agreement remains good for another year, and the electric company is going around cheaper gas and a more desirable light in the form of the electric light, have come to the conclusion that it is decidedly a disadvantage.

Skin Grafting by Machinery. Saturday morning, at the Massachusetts General hospital, a little instrument, invented by Dr. Miller, wonderful in its simplicity, constructed so as to separate quite large portions of epidermis from the underlying tissues, was used for the first time.

The patient had been etherized, and an operation for the removal of a cancerous growth from the left breast, and the wound thus made was quite an extensive one. A very few days will suffice to remove the denuded surface of the thigh to its normal condition, leaving few traces of the operation. Of course, every patient who is operated on in this manner is subjected to the usual anesthetic processes and antiseptic solutions, to render the operation thoroughly aseptic, and to prevent the possibility of any inflammatory disturbances from bacterial sources are reduced to the lowest minimum.
