MUST NOT BE USED IN MICHIGAN INSTITUTIONS.

Senator Whitlington's civil service bill killed with zealous and dispatch.

LANSING, April 28.—Upon convening this morning the senate immediately went into executive session, confirming the following appointments of the governor for members of the board of control of the Michigan Mining school.

Representative Botsford's bill preventing the use of oleomargarine or butter in any public institution of the state passed the senate this morning, that body giving precedence to Michigan cow rather than to the Chicago hog.

In committee of the whole Senator Crocker's bill repealing the charter of the Detroit M. O. Gleason Plank road was passed by a vote of 18 to 12.
