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THE HILL SALOON.

Resolutions Adopted by the Citizens' Meeting Saturday Night. The following resolutions were adopted at a largely attended meeting of the residents of the hill district, held at the Church of Christ Saturday evening: 1. That the portion of the Fourth ward known as the hill within the vicinity of East Bridge street is largely residential property, being as 100 to 1 in value compared to business interests.

2. That the location of a saloon or saloons upon said street or in the vicinity appreciates the value of property in relation to the morals of the community, and the sentiment of property owners and residents, with few exceptions, is decidedly opposed to the same.

3. That for about 15 years such sentiment and wishes of these people were sustained by the common council of this city, and until two years since, when the present applicants there located, with the policy of said common council, to locate saloons in residential districts, and in this particular district.

4. That it is a matter of common right and justice that the common council of this city should be held to its original position, and when not simply a majority but nearly three-fourths of the common council should be required to grant a license to a saloon in a residential district.

5. That a master of common right is recognized by the common council of this city in the construction of works of purely local concern that majorities shall rule, that the wishes of the majority shall be respected, and when not simply a majority but nearly three-fourths of the common council should be required to grant a license to a saloon in a residential district.

6. That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the chairman and secretary of this meeting, be delivered to the common council upon license, be presented to the common council of Grand Rapids in a proper manner as a committee shall deem proper.
