

THE SALOON ON THE HILL GRANTED A LICENSE.

An Unsuccessful Effort to Postpone the Water Works Bill—The "Hill" Saloon Granted a License.

The regular meeting of the council last night was attended by a large number of ladies and gentlemen from the hill district who wished to impress the council with the fact that they were in earnest in their opposition to granting saloon licenses in the neighborhood of Bridge street on the hill. It was a double-edged sword, as the gall field, wielded by president Saunders, the mayor coming in later.

A petition from property owners on the lines of the proposed South Park street highway, who are granting a franchise was referred to the committee on streets.

A petition to change the name of Center street to South Sheldon street was referred.

Onis of plainfield township asked the council to reimburse him in the sum of \$5 for damages he sustained in getting thrown from his wagon on upper Canal street. The matter was referred to the committee on claims and accounts.

Another long petition and the resolutions adopted at the mass meeting at Christ church Saturday relative to granting saloon licenses on the hill was referred to the committee on streets. A communication from the Central Labor union asking that the water bond election be deferred for two weeks was placed on file. The total amount in the committee on ways and means reported as being in the treasury for the ensuing year amounts to \$340,850.57. The committee on ways and means in a majority report recommended that the Telegram-Herald's bid for the city printing be accepted.

Alderman Hauser moved in a minority report recommending that the contract be given to the Daily Eagle. Alderman Carpenter moved that the subject matter be referred back to the committee and the papers furnish to the council a sworn statement of their circulation.

MOLDERS OUT AT THE SCHOOL FURNITURE FACTORY

The Company Gives Notice That It Will Employ a Foreign Firm to Supply School Furniture

Since the inauguration of the street car strike the general belief among union men has been that it was the initial step to break up the various unions of the city, and a strong impression has prevailed that in their position the street car company all along has been encouraged by some of the manufacturers of the city. It has been openly stated that in case the street car company was successful in breaking up the union among the molders, Friday night would be a general contract, a similar contract would be generally introduced throughout the factories of the city. How true this may be, time will best tell, but the action of the Grand Rapids School Furniture company Friday night seems to confirm the belief. The molders union next in strength, so far as numbers are concerned, is the Street Railway Employees' union, and it is much stronger financially. Such workmen are necessary to carry on a successful business, and for this reason but few dress-makers molders are to be found in the city. It is much to be regretted among the members of the union.

Five Thousand Idle on Account of Street Car Strike

DETROIT, June 22.—It will take the men 216 days to recover the losses they have already sustained since the strike commenced, said John Groce this morning. "We are not so much opposed to the strike as they say. We are as we are opposed to the tyrannical rule of the union. If they should win their demand for \$4 a day, the effect will be bad for them in the end, because the same condition of affairs will then prevail in all the cities. The men who were supposed to be \$4 a day, but there are only a few who get that; the men take jobs for much less and tell us that the strike is not worth it. The \$4 rate will be an inducement for stone-cutters to come here, and the town will be full of them. The Bazaar for Dirty Streets. A walk in the principal streets and avenues from 7 to 9 o'clock in the morning will convince the observer that, whatever the shortcomings of the street cleaning department, streetkeepers and housekeepers are generally incidentally responsible for dirty streets.

If the walk is extended to the basement home districts, it will require the day in the street, and to allow those materials to escape into the streets, the sidewalk walk from insufficient, improper overflowing receptacles. It will also be noticed that soon after a street has been cleaned by the city, the refuse and garbage from the neighboring buildings, and the dust and dirt from buildings torn down, scatter some part of their contents into the street as they proceed to their destination.

A student of the problem of street cleaning has the solution of the problem observations to learn the primary cause of dirty streets in New York, and that without a thorough reform in this particular, it is all in vain.

The simple solution of the problem is only the application to the streets of the familiar rule which governs every well regulated household. In a house to clean if the members of the family throw waste paper and other refuse on the floor, it is cleaned up the next day; and the same day the floors of the house are swept if such a practice is tolerated.
