THE PEOPLE'S COLUMN.

Prof. Carv's Logic Pancreated. EDWIN MORNING PRESS - I notice in your issue of the 10th inst. a long and windy article by Prof. D. W. Carv entitled "Talmage's E. Queen Nonsense," in which the excellent "Prof." denounces the Brooklyn preacher in a manner which bespeaks more real than knowledge. Like Mr. Carv, I too was one of the "huge audience" that was "tickled" by the eloquent lecturer, but unlike the "Professor," I was greatly pleased and I believe, benefited by what I heard. A few of his statements were, perhaps, exaggerated; his sequence became, at times, more bombastic; his logic was certainly lame at some points, but the effect of the whole was pleasing and inspiring, and what is most important, the spirit of it was true. He maintained that the world is constantly improving morally and otherwise, and no intelligent reader of history will disagree with him. There are unhappily many foul legs upon our civilization of today, but the patient reader will search long through the pages of history for a time when the world as a whole was as good or as happy as we ourselves see it.

Prof. Carv speaks of the wretched men compelled to toil in the dingy cellars for a miserable pittance, and the still more wretched women who have to drudge to "poverty, hunger and dirt" and who are frequently forced to live in hovels of shame in order to live at all, and no one will deny that such a state of affairs is an indelible disgrace to our Christian civilization. But it must be admitted by all who have read Talmage's sermons that no voice in these United States has been more constantly raised to the exposure and condemnation of the human hordes who feed on the labor and woes of others than his. Whatever may be said of him as a preacher or theologian, no one can deny his services to humanity in championing the cause of the wretched women of New York and of the poor and oppressed everywhere. Prof. Carv may dub him a "high flyer" or brand him a "mousetrap mousetrangler" but when he says that the "lowest toilers and groaners" of the land "stand ready to curse him and his guild, both here and hereafter," for trying "to render the struggling millions inanimate to their true condition," he grievously under-estimates the good sense of these same toiling masses. In fact it is among them that Talmage is most admired. In hundreds of thousands of working people's homes his utterances are read from week to week, and I maintain, Mr. Editor, that the working people of America are entirely competent to decide who are their friends and who are against them. Dr. Talmage did not say that the world "began in glory and would end in glory," but that it began with a garden and would end in a garden, and though so many find it a dreary wilderness at times, yet it must be admitted it is more nearly a garden today than ever before. There is much apparent disorder, but it is the disorder of reclaiming and cultivating; it is the disorder of building material and scaffolding flying around the edifices of reform.
