One Horse Power.

When men first began to become familiar with the methods of measuring mechanical power they often speculate on what the speed of horses in the found that can keep at work raising 13,000 pounds one foot per minute, or the equivalent, which is more familiar to some mechanics, of raising 330 pounds 100 feet per minute.

The horse power unit was established by James Watt about a century ago, and the figures were fixed in a curious way. Watt found that the average horse of his district could raise 23,000 pounds one foot per minute. At that time Watt was employed in the manufacture of engines, and customers were so hard to find that all kinds of artificial inducements were necessary to induce purchasers to buy steam engines.

As a method of encouraging them Watt offered to sell engines reducing output 100 foot pounds a horse power. And thus he was the means of giving a false unit to one of the most important measurements in the world.—Rider and Crockett.

A Curious Mining Collocation. The figure 9 is curiously and intimately connected with all the great gold mining excitements of the Nineteenth century.

The great and best Algerian gold bulb formed and broke in 1859. Next came the Mantuan mountain craze in 1858, when solid bowlders of gold as large as barrels were discovered in California gold fever broke out in 1849, and raged until contracted by the state of Nevada in 1859.

Eighteen hundred and seventy-one came on in time with the Leadville frenzy and the famous carbonate of lead country, Colo. Eighteen hundred and eighty-nine broke the charm, but 1890 may make up for lost time, there being two '90's in that date.—St. Louis Republic.
