WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Information from reliable sources has been compiled in the following cable received from Admiral Brown, dated Valparaiso, September 3:

Business fully resumed. Everything quiet. The cabinet members, including the two cabinet ministers arrived from Iquitos, Chile yesterday, and go to Santiago.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 3.—A dispatch from the City of Mexico says that the Anglo-American says a prominent gentleman of this city, who is well known in the Anglo-American colony, has received the following dispatch in regard to the situation in Mexico.

VALPARAISO, Sept. 1.—President Balmaceda is aboard the Gondal and expects to disembark at San Francisco tomorrow. However, if he publishes the latest warships he may land in Mexico. He does, extend all possible courtesies.

Here is the first definite news regarding the whereabouts of Balmaceda. The Imperator, torpedo boat, and the Gondal have been north at the present time. They are being cruised by the Congressional party. Whatever port the fleet destined party may make will be protected. No warship will attempt his capture within the Gulf of Mexico.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The following dispatch dated at Valparaiso, was received by the Congressional headquarters today:
