**DEPARTMENT PENSIONS.**  
A society of "Loyal Volunteers" has been formed at Washington having for its watchword, "Pensions to the Nedy Veteran."  
No difference how badly a man was wounded, nor how broken health, unless it is ready to meet him with a pension.  
It is the idea of the enemies of the pension system to favor of something that will split the black from the white sheep. I thank God every day of my life that I lived to the end of my days, and I cannot say myself believe that I am in any way disabled.  
We were surprised to see this expression from Capt. Balkan. We supposed that in common with the comrades of the Grand Army and in accord with the Republican party, he favored a dependent pension bill. President Cleveland refused a dependent pension bill. The late President Harrison approved one, and we have always understood that all loyal Republicans condemned Cleveland for his veto and applauded Harrison for his approval of a dependent pension bill.  
It is no longer a question of real need or actual poverty as the one and only claim for a pension. Fraud can be prevented by the proper administration of the law, but the law as it stands cannot be repaired. The party in power must repeal the dependent pension bill must be prepared to meet the united vote of the Grand Army.  
It is too late to say to the disabled veteran his pension must stop because it cost too much. There are thousands of men with one arm, or one leg, or one eye, or otherwise maimed during wars who apparently have no need of a pension. Many of them are in the vigor of life, and their families have salaries or fees therefrom that put them out of all possible need. There are others however, not so full, who are in business, apparently prospering and wealthy. But many of them are heavy men maimed or diseased to such an extent that they find it difficult to get for a pension on the ground that he is a pauper.  
We believe in a pension to the deserving, but we do not believe that the pension list should be a roll of honor of both rich and poor, and not a roll of paupers alone.
