

CHICAGO WANTS WATER.

A SUDDEN FALL OF THE LAKE CUTS OFF THE SUPPLY. The Surface of the Lake Lower Than Ever Before Known—The Trouble Caused by a Persistent Southwest Wind.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—Chicago is threatened with a water famine. The water in Lake Michigan is lower today than at any other time in the history of Chicago. The Lake View pumping works are entirely disabled.

Three causes have operated to bring about the remarkable condition of affairs—a stiff southwest wind has been blowing for twenty-four hours, the amount of precipitation in the catchment basin of the lake has been small for years, and the temperature has been much higher throughout the lake territory than generally prevails at this time of the year, causing an unusual evaporation.

When City Engineer Clark arrived at his office this morning he found his telephone bell ringing violently. It continued to ring all the morning. It was one continual wail from citizens who wanted to know "What was the matter with the water?"

Mr. Clark didn't know much about it himself until he telephoned out to the crib. He received the startling information that the water in the lake stood four feet below normal. The water was just high enough to struggle through the apertures in the dam with a very slow motion.

Long before Engineer Clark had been informed of the trouble, the various pumping stations throughout the city had become aware of the fall in the lake level. The big pumps went down in the night and the water came up to the level of the pumps.

Engineer Burke said this morning that the water in the city is "simply awful," said Mr. Burke. The five right pumps in the city are only able to supply the city with water at a level of one-half foot above the normal level.

The southwest wind blows the water drift away from the shore. The city engineers were in consultation this morning as to the best course to pursue. The possibility of a dam being discussed, and it was agreed that the present status of the water supply should be kept out of the public eye.
