FOR FREE SILVER

The Standing of the Committee on Coinage Is Quite Favorable to a Free Coinage Bill by Nearly Two to One. BOB BLACKER CHOSEN

TO FILL THE OFFICIAL SHOES OF THE LATE SECRETARY OF STATE. He Looks Over the Ground and Then Accepts—Saver Pays in Twenty-Five Dollars to Cover His Debt to the State—The Scandal May Be Unhushed Up.

LANSING, Dec. 23.—Hon. Robert R. Blacker of Manistowic was formally tendered the position of secretary of state by Governor Winans last night, and today came here to look over the ground. After posting himself as to the situation he decided to accept, and has so notified the governor.

Notwithstanding the action taken by the governor, the claim made by him that he was still secretary of state, he recognizes the fact that he is out, and will make no contest against Mr. Blacker. He paid into the treasury today the sum of \$25 to cover his indebtedness to the state, and promised to make good any further amount that may be found to owe upon a more thorough examination of the books.

Mr. Blacker will take his time to familiarize himself with the duties of the office, and will not make any immediate changes. Mr. Rowley will without doubt be a candidate for reappointment as deputy.
