

A BROKEN AGREEMENT

LEADS TO SOME REMARKABLY INTERESTING REVELATIONS OF CROOKEDNESS

A Bargain Entered Into to Break the Contract—A Suspicious Agent Violates the Contract and the Other Follows Sneak—A Lively Time Looked for Today.

The developments yesterday relative to letting the contract for vault and office furniture for the court house bids fair to cause an eruption of mammoth proportions and will keep some of the supervisors quite busy during a satisfactory explanation of the matter to their constituents and the taxpayers of the county.

Much has been written from time to time upon the subject and the only time in the past week has been the true in-wardness of the vault fixture business, but not until yesterday was the truth disclosed, although certain ones speculated that there was a large-sized skeleton in the closet.

Courtesy Clerk Harvey was so thoroughly convinced that something was wrong that he refused to execute the contract although the board ordered him to do so. The board ordered the company to whom the contract was let and returned over the refusal of Mr. Harvey to make a party to what he believed to be a scheme to rob and fail.

In every other effort to bring about a deal, the board, apparently to the surprise of a mandamus, an order was made requiring the clerk to show cause why he refused, and upon the hearing the Supreme court refused the mandamus.

Monday when the board convened the committee on vault fixtures made two reports. The majority report stated that after looking over the proceedings they had concluded to refer the matter to the prosecuting attorney and to that of Mr. Uhl and Mr. C. H. McGarry and Mr. McKnight held that the board had entered into a bargain and was bound to execute the contract.
