

A SKIRMISH IN MEXICO. THE REVOLUTIONISTS HAVE A BRUSH WITH THE REGULAR FORCES.

A "battle" in which twenty men were killed—Other skirmishes—A Popular Uprising—Fared after the Election—The Priests Said to be Responsible.

EL PASO, TEX., Feb. 16.—The news was confirmed here yesterday of a battle between the revolutionists and federal troops at Temochi Puebla, in Chihuahua, near the Sonora line, in which twenty men were killed, the most of whom were federals.

It is feared that a popular uprising of the lower classes will take place after the June election, when Diaz will begin his third term of the presidency.

THE COMPROMISE. BACKSLIPPING BELKNAP. THE COMPROMISE FAYE THAT DUD WATSON IS DOING IT.

WASHINGTON, Special Telegram, Feb. 15.—For six weeks I have known," says Congressman Belknap, "that there was an adverse influence of a political nature working against me here, and that it came from my district. I learned two weeks ago that Dud Watson of Coopersville, the ex-collector, had written Hon. Wm. M. Springer, the leader of the house, that every influence ought to be used to prevent me from receiving any important committee assignment, and I should be balked in securing any appropriations of any kind; that it was absolutely necessary to prevent me from securing any appropriation for a public building at Grand Haven, as such an appropriation would certainly be a political act and insure my re-nomination and re-election; and that to prevent this result I should receive no favors whatever from congress during this term."

He then introduced W. F. Coaling of Chicago, a smooth faced young man who frankly stated that the audience was the worst that he ever appeared before for the purpose of addressing. His address had by no means been committed to memory as he drew from an unlimited supply of subjects. He started on the subject of single tax, and went through, however, settled down to a steady grind on land ownership, sailed across to England, told the crowd that the laborer of England was better off than the laborer of America, and that he had benefited them one lot.

The estate is valued at from \$175,000 to \$200,000, consisting mostly of improved real estate. The will in dispute was made about ten years ago, and by its terms the entire estate is left to Mr. Brown's eldest daughter, Mrs. Margaret Haines, of Grandville.

Where Steel is Made.  
The general aspect of the interior of a converting house at night is at once startling and grandly impressive. Here heat, flame and liquid metal are ever present; locomotives whistle and puff steam with clatter and rattle; huge ladles of molten iron; the lurid light, flashing and flaming, that illuminates the scene, throws shadows so intensely black that they suggest the "black fire" of Milton, for in such a place it is impossible for a shadow to be cool; half naked, muscular men, bent over with sweat and dust, lift about; clouds of steam arise from attempts to cool in some degree the roasting earth of the floor, converters roar, rattle and rumble; flames mingled with splashes of metal from their white hot throats; at intervals the scorching air is filled with a rain of coruscating burning iron.

Ingot molds lift months parched with a thirst that can only be appeased for a short time by streams of liquid metal that run gurgling into them; the stalwart cranes rise, swing and fall, loading scores of tons of red hot steel upon cars of iron. All these conditions and circumstances combine to make an ingenious total more suggestive of the realms of Pluto than any other in the wide range of metal-urgic arts.—W. T. Dufferin in Popular Science Monthly.

When Animals Are "Charmed."  
Kalm mentions having seen a rattlesnake lying at the bottom of a tree on a hillside, with its head buried in its eyes on the little animal, which from that moment cannot move or escape, but begins a doleful cry, comes toward the snake, runs a little bit away, comes nearer, and finally is swallowed." But, as if to show that this result of bewitchment is not all that can be done with the eye alone, Dr. Andrew Smith says: "I have heard of cases in which antelopes and other quadrupeds have been charmed by the action of the eye of crocodiles, by the grimaces and contortions they practiced, as to be unable to fly or move from the spot. Some of the crocodiles were crocodiles who seized them."

This power is in the human animal developed to a very great extent, and the part that the eye plays in fascinating a fellow creature by mesmerism thus opening the way to almost infinite psychical results and unending known depths of possibility—is decidedly great in proportion to the magnetic force of the system, or rather the mind, for which it acts.—Chambers' Journal.
