

TERRIBLE CLOUD-BURST

SIOUX CITY, IOWA, RECEIVES AN AWFUL VISITATION.

A sudden Flood Descends Upon the City With- out Warning and Converts the Streets into Rivers Five Feet Deep—Thousands Homeless—Immense Damage.

FOUR HOMES, IOWA, MAY 18.—A telephone message from Sioux City says that a dreadful flood has overwhelmed that city. The streets are five feet under water and many lives are reported lost, to say nothing of the destruction of property. The inhabitants fled to the high grounds and took refuge to the roofs of buildings, but the latter resort proved fatal in many cases, as frame houses were swept away by the current and brick structures were undermined and crumbled into the flood. All communication with the desolated city is now cut off, neither telegraph nor telephone wires being in working condition.

OMAHA, MAY 18.—A report has been received here that a cloud-burst at Sioux City drowned out a thousand families. CHICAGO, MAY 18.—Up to a late hour tonight nothing definite can be learned from Sioux City. It is known that the city was overwhelmed by the big flood and that many houses were wrecked, railroads washed out, bridges carried away, and all wire communication to the city cut. It is known that a telephone one to Fort Dodge was that many lives had been lost, it is feared to be true, but that 1,000 lives have been lost so far, it is not believed to be true. Correspondents are on their way to the city from the east and west, and reports are being received by railroad. Their report is anxiously awaited.

THE PARTICULARS

LATER REPORTS ARE NOT SO BOD BY THE DISASTER AS SEEMS. SIOUX CITY, IOWA, MAY 18.—At seven o'clock this morning a great wave came down the Missouri river, which flows through the center of the town and which was already swollen bank full. Probably one-third of the inhabitants of the city live on the low lands and the first intimation many had was a volume of water three feet high spreading over the street. In a few minutes the water had risen above the first floors. Thousands of people fled in terror to the higher ground.

The water rose four feet in an hour and a half, and from 9 o'clock continued to rise steadily, but not so fast. The numbers were unable to escape and the work of rescue engaged every energy of the citizens.

At noon it was reported that eleven people had drowned, but there must be many more. When the flood from the Floyd river struck the Missouri, which was already very high, the water dammed up and inundated the adjacent low lands, the stock yards and packing houses, and the city of live stock. The water reached Jennings street on Fourth street. The Hotel Fowler and Boston Investment company's buildings were surrounded. It is estimated that 8,000 people have been driven from their homes.

Every effort is being made to relieve the distress. So far as known the names of the drowned are: NELLY WEST and child. MARY LOUISE HOSNER and two children. Others are lost, but the confusion and excitement are so great that it is impossible to learn the names or estimate the losses.

It has aroused no little consternation however, among the superstitious natives, who have fled to the dwellings and died to adjoining towns and hills.

He has no regard for the public good, and is fastened an incompetent chief upon the police department, and in "explaining" his profane and rowdy-like conduct at the board meeting publicly accused the board of being a "public nuisance" and of being forced upon men who voted for him by the disreputable whisky element.

There is hope, however, that some time more business-like and decent methods may be introduced. Commissioner Withey, after a year after a year on the board, realizes the condition of affairs, and does not hesitate to express his views.
