CUDEBACK ONCE MORE.

He is Likely to Do Time in State Prison. For Perjury.

Up in Lake county they have a different way of dealing with boy detectives than is practiced in this city. The way is so much different that for once in his life George Perry, alias Cudeback, is having a lively time with the Lake county authorities over a case of alleged poisoning.

Speaking of the matter the Lake County Star has the following:

"We are to advise you that Detective George Cudeback was arrested at Chase last night on a charge of perjury."

"The arrest is seems grewed out of a 'cook' who was arrested on a charge of evidence at the trial against Barkos or Burley and 'Doc' Rarkoff, two highly respected citizens of Chase on a charge of exposing poison to dogs and horses."

After Eastman dispensed with Cudeback's services, at the request of the commission, he secured the recommendation of the street railway company and distributed detective agency bills all over the state. This work, however, has been of a class shared by reputable detectives and he seems to have enjoyed it as a matter of course in his particular line.

One of his cards fell into the hands of John Harnas & Field of Chase who, it is claimed, lost a valuable dog by poisoning the "cook" was consulted and took the case to work up. Robert Joiner, one of the parties for whom he was working, furnished Rarkoff's name as well as that of Barkos Burley, and he detected them in exposing meat just as he expected to do for the state.

The respondents denied the story, and by his wife Rarkoff established his whereabouts at the time "Cuddy" was sneaking around the town.

The jury without deliberation returned a verdict of not guilty and the respondents were discharged.

Cudeback must now answer a charge of perjury which seems to be pretty well established, and is very liable to do time.

Say They Were Kidnapped.

Parrots as Disease Breeders.

An infection by parrots imported from Brazil has occurred in Paris. About three weeks ago a M. Dubois arrived from Brazil with about 500 parrots he intended to sell. On landing he fell ill, but recovering in about a week he came to Paris. He took up his abode with one of his former friends, M. Liénard, a tapmaker, living with his family in the Rue de la Roquette. A room in the house was cleared of everything and the parrots were let loose in it. An epidemic among the birds almost immediately declared itself. Many died during the following day, and afterward there are only two of them surviving. On the 16th inst. M. Dubois went into the wine shop occupying the ground floor of the house and kept by M. Barrasson, and remained there four or five hours writing letters.

On the following day Mlle. Mangrel, M. Barrasson's niece, aged twenty years, fell ill, and six days later she died of infectious pneumonia. M. Barrasson, a man of robust health, soon fell ill and entered the St. Antoine hospital, where he died yesterday of the same disease. M. Liénard, the wife of M. Liénard's friend who had housed the parrots, was also attacked by infectious pneumonia, and entered the same hospital on the 16th inst. She died a few days afterward. One of her daughters entered the hospital on the 9th inst. and died seven days subsequently. As for M. Liénard and his two daughters, they all caught the disease and are now lying dangerously ill at the St. Antoine hospital. M. and Mme. Boursay, living in Montmartre, who paid a visit to their friends the Liénards, after the arrival of M. Dubois and his parrots, both caught the fatal disease.

Mme. Boursay is already dead, and the life of her husband is despaired of. M. Wassier, a jeweler living in the Rue de la Roquette, who bought one of M. Dubois' parrots, is also dangerously ill. M. Vachon, living at St. Maurice, who bought a pair of the same birds, is likewise very ill with pneumonia, and M. Chapuis, a workman in the employ of M. Liénard, contracted the St. Antoine hospital yesterday morning. The sanitary authorities are now, though rather late, moving in the matter. The house in which the parrots were kept has been thoroughly disinfected.—Paris Cor. London Standard.
