SUBSTITUTE PURCHASES: It is surprising that the legislature of New York should enact a law that directs the payment from the state treasury to drafted men of money they paid out for substitutes.

Governor Flower has approved the law and unless there is something peculiar and exceptional in this scheme that makes it reasonable and defensible, Governor Flower can conclude beyond all question that his political course is ended.

There is still another feature about the affair that looks bad. When there was talk that Governor Flower would veto this bill Mr. Hull, the chairman of the grand jury, stated that Governor Flower would approve the bill because he was pledged to do so, upon which pledge he had received the solid support of the organization, representing at least 15,000 voters.

Such a record as this absolutely forbids all pretensions by Governor Flower to the Democratic nomination for the presidency. It is a record that will be heard with the Democrats of New York unless it can be shown that Republicans and Democrats alike were responsible for the infamous thing.

A CAT LET OUT: A special correspondent for the Eagle at Washington tells a great big black cat out of a deep den. Her name is Blaine. In substance Max Blaine does not like Harrison because in the first instance Harrison would not consent that Walker Blaine should be appointed assistant to his father in the state department, and that his approval has been strongly aggravated lately by Harrison refusing to take Colonel Coppinger, Blaine's son-in-law, from the bottom of the list and make him a brigadier general.

This last aggravation has been the final feather that broke the camel's back. Since that feather was put on the load of Blaine's hatred of Harrison his friends have got the wink that if he is wanted to lead the Republican ticket it is willing. Well, it is that not 'a state of things' it would be hard to find a deplorable condition in high politics. According to this, hatred and revenge are the two chief elements of human nature that inspires Blaine's candidacy and Harrison's despatch with one term. Can a campaign thus conceived in discord and petty spite be waged to a successful conclusion?
