If Mr. Cleveland is the nominee he will be the platform. Even if the platform declared for free silver it would not be acceptable to the country, with Mr. Cleveland, unless he acknowledged a change of heart.

The Democrats could easily make a sure thing of electing their ticket by nominating all purposes of trying to get a majority in the electoral college.

They should make no fight for election in Michigan save in one or two districts, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska and Minnesota.

These states should be left to the People's party, and their own partisans advised to work and vote for that party.

This would leave them free to concentrate their money and speakers on the doubtful congressional districts and doubtful counties. It would enable them to throw a greater force into Indiana, Illinois, Connecticut and New York.

It is fallacious to say that the platform of the electoral college would be sure to elect in the house of representatives, or if the Republican electors concentrated on the People's party candidates in the electoral college they would at least be sure of beating Harrison and making themselves strong with the new president through their vote in the house of representatives.

Blaine was never stuck on the McKinley bill, in fact it is known he was bitterly opposed to it. He was also the author of a force bill every time that measure was brought forward.

Now if Mr. Blaine is such a great Republican leader in this Harrison and McKinley era what makes him such a leader in the present era? He is not as prominent as upholding the McKinley bill and advocating the force bill.

If Mr. Blaine is such a great leader why don't the people's party great leaders use his name? Mr. Lincoln was a great leader of the party in his day but if the party had declared for emancipation and Mr. Lincoln had opposed it he would not have been considered the leader of the party of its commanding officer.

THE MINER LAW. The supreme court of this state, three Republicans and two Democrats, has done itself great credit by deciding the Miner law constitutional.

The law upon the subject has not been doubted by seven-eighths of the lawyers of the country and the court could only have upset the law by ignoring precedent and unquestioned construction extending through a third of our history.

But it was confidently expected by certain leading Republicans of the state that the court would decide the case in accordance with the interests of the party.

It is now seen they had too low a conception of the character of the court. The opinion of the court was written and delivered by Judge Montgomery and establishes his reputation on the supreme bench as a learned jurist and honest man.

Year-old Robert Dillmore of Flint has been taken to the hospital, also several stitches and a ragged scalp. His elder brother took with a 22-caliber revolver.

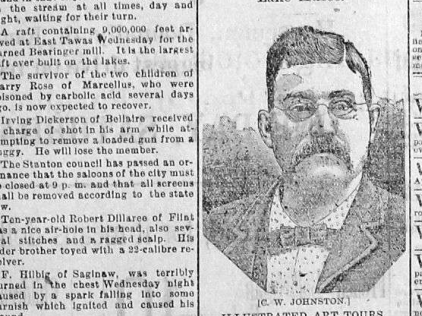
F. Hibbig of Saginaw, was terribly burned in the week Wednesday night caused by a spark falling from a furnace which ignited and caused his wound.
