Exciting Scenes and Great Expenditures of Enthusiasm Likely to Be a Hot Fight Over Temporary Chairman of the Convention.

CHICAGO, June 20.—A perspiring, sweating man, a yelling, enthusiastic crowd, loud political workers behind closed doors, brass bands and club street parades, stump speeches in hotel corridors, and a mass of all sorts, ninety per cent, full on their face and determined to prove their worth by shouting, howling for effect, drinking cocktails to keep up steam, is an epitome of the situation that will be the battle ground of the Cleveland men and suits have not passed an idle day, although many of the rank and file have devoted their attention to harmless enthusiasm. All sorts of stories are afloat and the more preposterous they were the more credence they found.

The conservative opinion is that the fight between Cleveland and the anti's diminishes as the hours roll on. It is seen to be one of the most unorthodox Democratic fights where in the one end side lies down inside the other. It looks now as if Wilson will be selected as temporary chairman, though Owens may be allowed to go in, as Whitney advised a policy and his counsel generally prevailed.

The New York Hill delegations this afternoon issued a circular saying in reply to inquiries addressed by delegates instructed to vote for Cleveland that the Cleveland men and suits have not passed an idle day, although many of the rank and file have devoted their attention to harmless enthusiasm.

If the Hill Democracy of New York had any hopes of the nomination of Hill, they have a strange way of showing it. Following up the issuance of the circular above referred to, the New York Hill organization, composed of about 5 p. m., made a great street demonstration. Between 3,000 and 4,000 true men with their hands on their hips, shouting Tammany against Tammany of New York city, preceded by their mammoth banner, an Indian chief, and Tammany was the Kings' county, Erie county and still. The parade carried the Cleveland men and suits, and indicated that Hill is still in the ring.

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The meeting of the national committee this afternoon was a hot one. When the chairman of the national committee, the sub-committee on temporary chairman was taken up, Watson said he had come from Whitney and that what Owen was satisfactory to the Cleveland men. Dornan of Minnesota said he was in favor of Whitney and that the Cleveland men were not likely to accept this challenge, though some hot-headed Cleveland men seemed to do so at the meeting at Whitney's parlors in progress tonight and the leading topic under discussion was whether to elect Owen or not.
