He Indorses the Platform But Fears He Is Too Poor and Feeble.

OMAHA, Neb., June 25.—A renouveau was caused in People's party circles by the announcement that Judge Wm. Greaham had consented to accept the nomination for the Presidency at the hands of the People's party if it received him.

The intelligence came in the form of a telegram from Harry Vincent, editor of the Non-Commutist, an Indianapolis paper, to Judge Greaham, secretary of the Nebraska independent state committee. It was, in substance, that the convention had been held with Judge Greaham and that he had said he would accept the nomination from the People's party convention at Omaha if allowed to stand on the platform adopted at the recent conference of labor and industrialists.

Judge Greaham's declaration was the subject of an editorial in the Non-Commutist, which was a strong man to the list of their available candidates. It was pointed out that the decision made the disintegration of the old party, which had been the result of the election of Greaham, unnecessary. It was stated that Greaham's acceptance would be a blow to the party.

An ex-Worker, who is now a resident of Omaha, said that he had seen Judge Greaham at the meeting of the People's party at Omaha. He said that Greaham was in a very poor state of health and that he was afraid to go to the platform.

HE RESIGNS

It is Not Located in Washington, But On The Finest Thoroughfare in Kent County

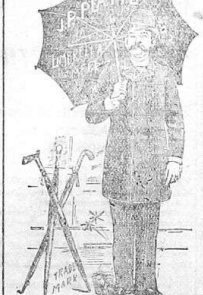
