The City National Bank Building to be remodeled.

Plans have been drafted for rebuilding the City National bank building at the corner of Pearl street and Campan square.

The Pearl street side will be entirely rebuilt, and a conspicuous feature of the new building will be the communicating with the elevators.

The walls will be strengthened by a heavy steel inside framework, and will be carried up to make a six-story building.

The work will be finished, it is expected, by the first of November.

This corner was the site of the Tool Guild homestead, which was the first frame house erected in the city and in which was celebrated the first wedding ceremony in Kent county.

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FREE COGNAC PASSES

The Senate Captured by the Silver Men.

An Absolute Free Cognac Bill Adopted Without a Restriction.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The free silver bill comes to a vote in the senate this afternoon as expected.

Some time ago an agreement was made that a vote should be had at 2 o'clock this afternoon, but afterwards an understanding was had that it should be postponed till some day next week.

The matter came up today, however, Mr. Morgan said that he could find no one who wished to speak to the question and asked that it go to a vote as ordered.
