CHAIRMAN TAUBENACK.

His View of the Free Silver Men—The People's Party's Bright Prospects. Hon. H. E. Taubenschlag, chairman of the executive committee of the People's party, during attendance upon the silver convention in Washington, granted The Economist an interview. "I am here as a looker on in Yenna," he said pleasantly with a wave of his hand toward the platform of the Convention hall, where Shinn, of Kansas, was holding forth to less than 200 delegates and visitors, "not in official capacity. I have little hope of our being able to force our interests with these people. They have only one issue—free coinage. They wish to eliminate from our platform everything but a financial plan, and dictate that. It is not hard enough while we recognize the justice of their demands, we have others even more material to do battle for. If they cannot support our measures (including their own), they have only to leave sectional property. "In other words, they want to ride your horse in their race?" Yes, and the People's party have put forth a platform which has received indorsement from Maine to California; they could not at the eleventh hour recant and promulgate another. Now I wanted this convention to meet at Omaha during ours. There they would have felt the popular pulse of all sections, while here the silk-hatted, kid-gloved audience who listen to their tale of woes, is, as you see, controllable. "Tell you something about the march of the new party?" "It amounts in many sections to a hand-to-hand. States which have been wedded to Republicanism or Democracy since the war are getting out of doors papers right along. Mr. Davis, of Texas, stepped to me at Omaha, where I recently met him, that Texas had already organized 800 People's party clubs and would give us over 75,000 votes. We confidently count on carrying the state and electoral vote of North Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky, Kansas, Nebraska, the two Dakotas, Minnesota and Texas, with a powerful vote in Wisconsin and Michigan. "What will be the numerical position of the People's party in the Fifty-third congress?" "That of balance of power. We will elect a great number of representatives. This is conceded now even by our enemies."—National Economist.

The Catechism in South Carolina. Are you in favor of restoring the volume of currency to the same ratio that it sustained to the population and land area of the country when the public debts were contracted? Are you in favor of prohibiting the manufacture of gunpowder in agricultural products, that turns the farmer of all his hard-earned gold and silver into the hands of the country? Are you in favor of free coinage of silver? Are you in favor of prohibiting the ownership of land by aliens and the speculative holding of land by speculators? Are you in favor of a tariff for revenue only, and that levied upon the industries rather than the necessities of life? Are you in favor of a graduated tax on incomes? Are you in favor of limiting all state and national revenues to the necessary expenses of the government, economically and honestly administered? Are you in favor of honest and just rights control of railroads and telegraph lines? Are you in favor of election of United States senators by direct vote of the people? These questions embody the demands of the Farmers' Alliance and kindred organizations of farmers and laborers, and to be made effective they must enter as factors in Democratic clubs, primaries and conventions. As arranged, the annual election of each territorial man would be "yes" to every one—Cotton Plant.

SHYLOCK OUTSHYLOCKED. NEW YORK AND RETURN.

Editorial Tools Insult and Lie About the Hon. Mr. McKim Have Robbed. Commenting upon the tabulated list of thirty-five confirmations published in The Tribune May 5, the Kansas City Gazette says: The statement shows that the mortgaged property worth \$2,000,000 more than the face of the mortgages. This means that there was a profit of \$2,000,000. The above comment, being quoted approvingly by the ten-dollar organ of the shrewd Republicanism of this city may be fairly quoted as voicing the sentiment of Republican party leaders here. They have been driven to this extremity in their vain effort to cover up the crime of contraction of the currency, for which they are responsible. Rather than acknowledge the truth, they prefer to contend that the owners of the farms, the appraisers who certified to property values under oath, as well as the agents who negotiated and guaranteed the loans, all conspired to defraud the man who loaned the money. Likewise that the money lender was just big enough fool to allow them to do it. And yet, by proclaiming the truth that Kansas, with its \$515,000,000 of mortgages, is largely peopled by knaves who will not pay, and who would not be satisfied "to redeem the credit of the state." Not content with evicting farmers from their homes, they add insult to injury by proclaiming that the bone and sinew of our state have "swindled the loan companies." On the other hand, they contend with the deed to the property he forfeit to receive in case his bond was forfeit? Why then should he hold over the heads of his victims a judgment which threatens to take from them all their future earnings until usurious demands are satisfied? Shylock takes no risks in any of the vicissitudes of life—all health or accident, drought or flood, wind or storm, church or grasshoppers—his bond secures him against all these. He has moreover so manipulated the finances that even a good crop brings the farmer no surplus cash, Shakespeare's Jew himself complained— You take my house when you do take the prop; And doth entail it on mine only child. When you do take the means whereby I live, You rob not only me, but him my heir. You are allow the creditor to pursue the debtor to the last extremity and use every agency within his power to bring about the unfortunate debtor's downfall, even to taking the means whereby he and his family may continue to live. The modern Shylock outshylocks the old Shylock by evicting the farmer, he hires his victim's agent to goad the victims of his malice to desperation by leasing to their disgruntled heads, falsely representing that "the plotter is really the victim." That these editors are so learned to do this language they use—"shillies," "worked some joint," "borrowed to speculate," "raided with consumable," "from companies have been mighty clever," "belonging for government aid," "contributions regarding the credit of the world," "pious little bit of corn" are simple expressions from the Irish limits of the article from which we have quoted.
