TWELVE THOUSAND PERISH.

One of the Philippine Islands Destroyed by Volcanic Eruption.

SYDNEY, July 18.—Rumors have reached here that one of the islands, the island of Sangar, one of the Philippine group, and that most of the inhabitants have been killed.

A native from the Talais Islands who had returned here about four weeks ago, brought a remarkable story to the effect that several other natives had just returned from a voyage near Sangar. They had intended to land on the island, but were prevented by a volcanic eruption. They reported that the "whole island was on fire."

The water along the coast was full, they said, of half-burned wrecks, pieces of iron and other articles. The whole population, estimated at 12,000, seemed to have been swept into the sea or burned, as not a living soul was to be seen. The water was still flowing toward the shore, showing that the activity of the volcano had not abated.

WARMAPS REISSUED

The Homestead Leaders Are Charged With Murder.

The Latest Move of Carnegie's Manager in the Labor Battle.

PITTSBURG, July 18.—Warrants were issued today for the arrest of Burgess Luckie of Homestead, Hugh O'Donnell and other leaders of the Homestead strike on a charge of plotting murder.

Burgess Luckie, when advised of the fact came to Pittsburgh, delivered himself up to the officers and is now in jail. O'Donnell is absent at the East and up to this evening none of the other defendants has been taken into custody.

It is rumored that counter information will be made against Frank Secretary Lovoy of Carnegie. Secretary Lovoy is now in Pittsburgh and has no complaint against the situation. The company has failed to bring in non-union workmen from England.

THREE HUNDRED DEATHS.

PARIS, France, July 18.—Three hundred deaths from cholera have so far been registered at the board of health. A reporter informed Drs. Dujardin, Beaumier, Protot and other medical gentlemen on the origin of the disease. Dujardin expressed himself as follows:

The present epidemic is undoubtedly due to the use of polluted Seine water for drinking purposes and the living unburied bodies of cholera victims. He thinks the epidemic has reached its limit and will not extend beyond St. Denis. That neighborhood had the distinction of being the most infested area notwithstanding the fact that everything was done to arrest the progress of cholera.

CHILDREN DYING BY HUNDREDS.
