

TRIP TO MILL BRICK

A Crazy Anarchist Shoots and Stabs Him.

The Wounds Are Not Serious and He Will Probably Recover.

DETAILS OF THE SHOOTING.

No One Threatened Jim Frick and His Murderer on Assault.

The shooting occurred a few seconds before 1:45 o'clock this afternoon in Mr. Frick's private office on the sixth floor of the Chronicle newspaper building on Fifth avenue.

A moment before the elevator came, a dark-complected young man, neatly dressed in a blue cloth, entered the elevator car on the first floor and requested to be let out at the office of Mr. Frick. He was accompanied by an older man, while the car was ascending toward the sixth floor.

As the passenger acted rather nervously and had a weak look, but as he was a stranger, the elevator man, while the car was ascending toward the sixth floor, did not give the slightest thought to the man.

Leaving the car, the stranger proceeded across the hall and entered Mr. Frick's office. He remained in the office for a few moments, and then he turned to the door and looked out into the hall.

At the sight of the clerk, the man who had been in the office, he dashed out of the door, but instead of taking the stairs, he ran down the hall, and in the process of his flight, he was struck by a bullet which was standing there with the door open.

THE ASSAULT.

HIS WOUNDS.

Late Last Night the Surgeons Said the Shooting Was Not Fatal.

Immediately after the shooting, doors leading from the Carnegie office building were closely guarded, and admittance was denied to every body, no matter what the nature of his business.

All the physicians in the immediate neighborhood were summoned, and Dr. J. H. McLaughlin, a prominent physician, at his head, proceeded to administer to the wounded man. He was weak from the loss of blood, and suffering great pain, still retained consciousness.

Mr. Frick was lying on a couch when the doctors arrived. An examination showed that three shots had taken effect, one in the ear, another in the neck, and a third in the back. The unfortunate man had also sustained a serious laceration in the back from a sharp barbed wire.

It is reported that the nature of the wounds is not so serious as it was at first supposed to be. The physicians exerted themselves to the utmost to save the man, and he is now recovering from his wounds.
