THOUSANDS IN LINE

The Great Knight Templar Parade at Denver. A Fine Display and Magnificent Success in Every Respect. DENVER, Aug. 9.—Prompts at 10:45 o'clock this morning a grand parade of Knights Templar which constitutes the escort of the grand encampment to its asylum, moved from Fourteenth and Market streets on its long march through the principal streets of the city.

From early morning preparations had been going on for the big event, and the streets were crowded with people who participated in the parade.

Fully 30,000 additional knights arrived in the city yesterday and nearly half that number this morning. It is calculated that not fewer than 25,000 people participated in the parade.

The handling of the knights was accomplished with considerable dispatch. The separate divisions were formed on side streets and the arrangements were so perfect that every division moved in its line in excellent order.

All along the line the people crowded so as to form an unbroken line 9 miles in length and there could not have been less than 200,000 people viewing the march.

The grand encampment officers were driven from their headquarters at the Brown Palace hotel in carriages to the official reviewing stand on the corner of Eleventh and South avenue.

The review stand was reached about 10:30 o'clock as the cowboys in their picturesque costumes came in view. The multitude awaiting the arrival of the grand encampment officers at the reviewing stand started enthusiastic cheering which was continued until Grand Master Gled took his seat.
