

A FOOTHOOD GAINED

Five Fatal Cases of Cholera in New York.

There is No Doubt that the Pest is in the Metropolis.

New York, Sept. 14.—The health board officers this afternoon discovered a genuine case of Asiatic cholera in this city.

The board of health announced this afternoon that from a bacteriological examination by Prof. Herman Biggs of the bodies of several suspected cholera patients, there have been five deaths from Asiatic cholera in the city of New York.

All these cases were originally reported to the health department as suspicious, and have been under the investigation of the physicians connected with the department.

Everything is quiet at Erie Island today. Colonel Anson and his regiment, the Thirtieth, are here.

The news came in by telegraph and the operators called after the officers. Sontag and Evans seized the horses of the murdered officers and escaped, and Dick Olson fell dead from their saddles.
