

ROUNDED DEMOCRACY.

The Democratic county convention held yesterday in Patriarchal Circle hall on Lyon street was a typical semblance of the party. It was well attended from all parts of the county and the old hall was fairly abuzz by the yells at times. Enthusiasm bubbled and flowed and exclamation and recrimination followed each other around the room and down through the halls to the street. The delegates of the Arcade made a recess and the imps of darkness had improved the opportunity to wage a war on parliamentary law.

It was 11:15 when Chairman L. E. Carroll called the braces to order and gave the signal to start the Sioux high dance. The hall was completely filled, and after order was restored, the speaker called to the chair E. A. Maher, who expressed himself according to a long line of precedents established by the ancient customs of the party.

John S. Hooker was chosen as temporary secretary after which the following were decided upon as the personnel of the committee: Credentials—L. A. Solomon, Paris; F. H. Hoofard, Grand Rapids; B. B. Squires, Rockford.

Organization and Order of Business: Hiram Chambers, Alpine; James N. Davis, M. H. Houseman, John H. White, Waples, Cascade; G. A. Lusk, Cedar Springs.

After the committee were named the convention took a recess until 11:30. The afternoon picnic. The convention was rather slow in getting to work in the afternoon. It was nearly 9 o'clock when Chairman Maher stepped to the front and called for the report of the nominating committee.

The action of Alderman Turner's report was considered read, notwithstanding Dan Donahue made a kick and attempted to start a racket, but was shut down.

A committee on permanent organization and order of business reported in favor of making the temporary organization permanent and proceeding with the usual order of business that governs conventions.

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CHOLERA IN NEW YORK.

Another Suspicious Case Has Been Reported.

There is No Panic and Every Precaution is Being Taken.

New York, Sept. 15.—The appearance of cholera, despite the strict regulations at quarantine and the vigorous precautions taken by the board of health, has produced a general feeling of uneasiness but no panic among the residents of New York.

The health authorities say that the five cases of cholera which have been reported were sporadic in their nature and do not indicate that the disease has got a foothold. Other similar cases, they say, may occur before the cold weather comes on, but if they are properly handled there will be no danger that the disease will spread.

One new case was reported this morning, but it is not certain that it is real cholera. A million official circulars directing the use of care and prescribing treatment for the disease have been distributed throughout the city. The houses where the five persons died from the disease are under the strictest surveillance, and every article of furniture which may contain the germs of the disease have been disinfected. The hospitals are on the alert for new cases and about eight hundred physicians stand ready to lend assistance in case of an outbreak.

The sanitary corps is engaged in going through the crowded and filthy tenement districts examining into the condition of the people and scattering disinfectant and chloroform in four or five languages—everywhere.

One More Case. New York, Sept. 15.—At 5 o'clock this afternoon the health board announced another case of cholera, Mary Connaughty, aged 19, living on Second avenue. She was removed to the hospital and the premises placed under rigid quarantine.

THE QUESTION OF QUARANTINE. Washington and Chicago Officials are Watching New York.

Washington, Sept. 15.—While there is no semblance of a cholera scare in this city, there is an earnest and general interest in any further cases of cholera there.

Chicago, Sept. 15.—The cold nights of the week, coupled with the foggy weather and the admirable arrangements made for the city, have resulted in the fact that the city officials hesitate to declare a quarantine against New York. It is, however, necessary to insure through passage.
