

BURNED IN A WRECK

Terrible Crash on an Ohio Railroad. Eight or Ten People Killed by a Collision Near Shreve.

WOODEN, O., Sept. 21.—The Chicago express train crashed into a freight on the Fort Wayne road at Shreve, O., this morning, wrecking both trains.

The express was approaching at full speed, when the freight, which had been in the main track, suddenly pulled onto the main track in front of it.

There were five clerks at work in the postal car, and five others were instantly killed and the fifth one fatally injured.

Fire communicated from the fire box of the engine to the postal car, and in a short time the car was a blazing mass.

From there the flames swept to the two postal cars, and before the passengers could succeed in checking the fire, the baggage car, smoker and day coach were reduced to ashes.

The only cars that escaped the flames were three Pullman coaches and a special car which was attached to the rear.

The list of killed and wounded is as follows: Killed—A. D. Glenn, front brakeman; Frank J. Allen, baggage press train; O. B. Fennell, baggage press train; A. Hammond, Allegheny.

FOUR MEN KILLED BY A MILLION DOLLAR TREASURE SAVED.

TORONTO, Kan., Sept. 21.—A passenger train on the Santa Fe road was wrecked by train robbers near Otago City early this morning and five persons killed.

In the express car was a million dollars in gold and notes which was being carried by the passengers.

Several passengers saw some men running through the woods in the night of the disaster. Officers are now scouring the country in search of the wreckers.

The killed were Engineer Edward Myers, Fireman Thomas Chaddick, Simon Blumhardt, the express guard, and a brakeman.

As soon as news of the wreck reached this city a relief train was made up and sent out with surgeons on board.

The Proprietor of a Targum Gallery Shoots Himself.

A. B. Lawrence, who has been running a shooting gallery at North Park during the summer, was fatally shot by the accidental discharge of a Flobert rifle on the West Michigan fair grounds at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

He had transferred his shooting gallery from the park to the fair grounds and was located between the general entrance doors against the rear of the grand stand.

He was standing in the line of fire when the gun was empty but it contained a cartridge. He inserted the rafter and withdrew it two or three times, laid the muzzle toward the counter with the hammer cocked.
