

NEW ORLEANS THE TOP

Only One Newspaper Being Published.

All Branches of Trade Suspended and the End Not in Sight.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 7.—The effects of the strike were more apparent today than at any time since the trouble commenced.

So far the city is remarkably quiet and but little business is being done.

The decision of the typographical union to join the strikers has not nerve the other bodies which were neutral in the matter, and all of the labor unions which signed the call for the general strike are now out except the cotton harvesters.

The only sign of activity is in the wholesale grocery district against which the strike is principally directed.

The proposition made through the committee to arbitrate the question of hours and wages, but to leave the question of union entirely alone, has not been responded to by the labor side.

A GREAT SCHEME

PREPARING FOR WAR.

Russia Disarranging the Money Market and Accumulating Gold.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Saturday Review publishes an alarmist article on the withdrawal of gold on Russian accounts.

"According to a semi-official statement issued in St. Petersburg early in the week," it says, "the Russian government has in that city and with its agents abroad a sum of 200,000,000, yet for some time past it has been withdrawing immense sums in gold from its foreign assets, especially from Blichroeder in Berlin.

The question why this course should be pursued is puzzling every observer and causing uneasiness, but very real anxiety among the most judicious. It seems perfectly certain that Russia has no means of her own to meet all her payments to western Europe for interests, stores, war material, political purposes, family relief, etc., unless she sends gold (instead of paper) and gold is actually taking gold from London and Berlin.

The government can pay all its internal expenditures for whatever purpose simply by printing money.
