

MAYOR'S POWERS

New Orleans is Bordering Upon Anarchy.

The Situation More Tense and the Militia All Under Arms.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 10.—The mayor issued a proclamation this morning calling upon all good citizens to present themselves at the city hall to be sworn in as special policemen.

The call of the mayor for assistance was fruitless. Only 18 men answered the summons and were sworn in.

Public sentiment is intense and the city is ripe for a call to arms.

Every military company in the state is under arms and ready to respond at a moment's notice.

RESTRICTING IMMIGRATION.

The Barriers Will be Maintained Against Cholera.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—In view of the still lingering possibility of a fresh outbreak of cholera in European countries in the early spring and the consequent danger of its introduction into the United States, the officials of the treasury department have determined to maintain the utmost vigilance in guarding our ports against the entrance of people or merchandise to which it is possible to convey the germs of the dread epidemic.

Restrictions on immigration will be generally discouraged and the provisions of the president's proclamation of Sept. 1, imposing a quarantine on all suspected immigrants, will be vigorously enforced.
