As Usual It Was Enacted in Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—The most terrible tragedy which has taken place in this city in months was enacted at 731 North Paulina street this morning.

Sligler always had the reputation of being a steady, industrious German. SAVING SOULS.

Evangelists at Work in the Joy Memorial Church.

Joy Memorial church was filled last night to its utmost seating capacity the special attraction being the talk by Rev. George L. Barker, an evangelist of Hartford, Conn., who is now making a tour of the country in company with Isaac M. Meredith, who assists in the work of saving souls with a rich, musical voice.

Rev. Barker and his assistant both come from Hartford and have both labored long in the work of salvation. They gained considerable favorable comment for the work done at the Ocean Grove campmeeting, the largest one ever held on the continent. Their manner of conducting services changes at each service and the spirit moves them.

Last evening the services were quite interesting. Dr. Barker took for his text the seventh verse of the fourth chapter of Hebrews: "Today if you hear Christ harden not your heart." In outlining his subject he related a number of interesting incidents and used them as illustrations of the "hardening process" as he termed it, which is going on in men's hearts. He called attention to the work of the devil and said: "He is rocking the world to sleep." He claimed the liberal Christian as the servant of the devil and took occasion to emphasize his opinion of such people and their leaders. In this connection he referred to the rum traffic and said he made no war with the seller because he had a soul to save but his business should be conducted in hell where all so-called liberal Christians would be found at the blowing of the big horn.

"Some," he said, "within the sound of my voice and without salvation will want a funeral sermon preached over their corpse. Who will do it? The liberal Christian preacher will send you direct to heaven and right here let me say there is a wonderful amount of lying done at some funerals."

On Saturday night will be given a flag service illustrating the voyage of life. A service for ladies only will be given Thursday and one for men only next Sunday afternoon.
