GREAT METEORIC STONE

It Weighs Ten Tons and is Found in a Heated Condition. NEWCASTLE, Col., Dec. 1.—A stone weighing 10 tons fell from the sky, striking the earth a mile northwest of here, yesterday. There were no witnesses as far as known to the meteor's fall, but the fact that it sunk deep into the earth and was in a heated condition when discovered leaves no doubt in the minds of the inhabitants as to where it came from and great excitement exists. The stone is a color entirely foreign to the locality, being slate colored, and the people are convinced that it dropped from the comet.

It is immense in proportion and should it be removed an ordinary means outside of blasting could accomplish the purpose. There have been 1,000 men, women and children who went today to look upon it, and all express themselves as astonished and well paid for the trip. It has the appearance of having been through fire as though from a volcano and of being thoroughly burned. It looks porous, and it is of a mineralized nature. Those who were at first incredulous concerning it are now much gratified, and scores are going out to the grounds to view it, many from a distance. The people here call it Biele's comet. People are talking of claiming it and holding it for exhibition.

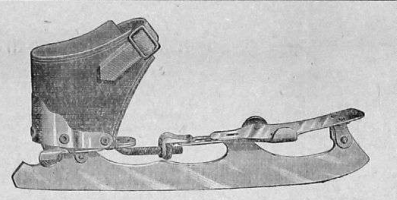
