

RICHARDSON LAW N. G.

It Tried to Enforce a Repealed Act.

The Roads Having Special Charters Escape Special Taxation.

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 9.—The coming report of Railroad Commissioner Harrison is usually made to the Michigan state committee on transportation, which is the Richardson railroad tax legislation, enacted in 1911, is in its most important feature, nugatory and of no effect.

This important legislation furnished a wealth of Democratic material both in the recent state campaign and the canvass for congress which Mr. Richardson made in the Fifth district.

There were two laws, although reference is usually made to it as the Richardson law. One law applied to railroads incorporated under the general law and the other roads operating under special charters. It is the latter which the commissioner now holds to be practically void, No. 133 of the general laws of last session. It provides that every railroad or railroad company organized or existing under any special act or acts of incorporation or special or general law and before been taxed under any special act or acts of the legislature of the state, shall, from and after Dec. 31, 1922, be subject to the provisions of chapter 25, of the compiled laws of 1921 and the acts amendatory thereto, the same as if every such company had organized under the provisions of such chapter.

Mr. Whitman finds that chapter 91 of Howell's statutes was enacted in 1879, and that section 13 of article 5 of that act repeals chapter 25 of the compiled laws of 1921. Accordingly the Richardson bill, No. 133, 1922, being a special act, is not subject to the provisions of chapter 25, of the compiled laws of 1921, and the act amendatory thereto, the same as if every such company had organized under the provisions of such chapter.

BROKE HIS NECK.

Thomas McFee Thrown From a Wagon and Killed. A couple of boys walking along the public road near Kinnery yesterday afternoon found the dead body of a man lying by the roadside.
