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TRAGIC ACCIDENT ON THE GREAT WESTERN RAILROAD.

We are indebted, says the Rochester Democrat, to Mr. Wm. Cox, of Philadelphia, who was a passenger on the New York Express train, in company with Mrs. George West Markham, and others, for the following interesting narrative of an accident which occurred on the south side of a mountain, between Copstown and Dundas.

On the 21st inst. a passenger train was wrecked on the south side of a mountain, between Copstown and Dundas. About twelve rods of engine and tender were swept away and fell to the depth of forty feet. I was in the sleeping car at the rear of the train.

There were about seventy passengers on the train in all, and a great many were killed and hurt. The engine and tender were completely wrecked, and the boiler was burst.

The passengers in the second car were obliged to jump from the rear end to the engine, a distance of fifteen feet. Among the injured were Mrs. Markham, and others.
